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2024 COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT HIGHLIGHTS

The Positives	Challenges
 Most Adams County Adults are satisfied or very satisfied with their lives. The natural beauty of Adams County is viewed as an asset to health and happiness. Over 90% of Adams County adults have some form of health care coverage. Healthcare infrastructure includes a Critical Access Hospital, Cancer Center, Dialysis Clinic, 2 Federally Qualified Health Centers, Look-Alike FQHC, Rural Health Center, Inpatient Hospice, and a free-standing Urgent Care Center More primary and specialty healthcare providers serving the County. Mental and Behavioral healthcare access has improved since earlier community health assessments. Affordable, county-wide public transportation has expanded since last the health assessment. Collaborative approach by county agencies and stakeholders to recognize and address behavioral health needs of vulnerable populations within the community. Adams County has a school-based health clinic. Adams County agencies and service organizations demonstrate willingness and ability to collaborate. Adams Lake State Park and Edge of Appalachia preserve system offers abundant exercise and fitness opportunities. 	 Life expectancy in Adams County is lower than that throughout Ohio and the nation. Greater percentage of adults in Adams County have been diagnosed with depression than throughout Ohio and the U.S. Drug overdose related death rate among Adams County adults greater than three times that seen nationally and continues to rise. Adams County lacks a facility providing shortterm housing, assessment, and stabilization for community members experiencing behavioral health crisis. Over two-thirds of Adams County Adults are either overweight or obese. Heart disease and cancer deaths, the leading causes of death in Adams County, occur at rates 40% higher than that seen nationally. Health inequity within Adams County is driven by poverty, lack of reliable and convenient transportation, and presence of mental and behavioral health disorders. Over 30% of Adams County children live in poverty, the 8th highest county 10th graders viewed their current mental and emotional health as excellent, very good, or good. Adams County 10th graders are more likely to smoke and drink alcohol than their state and national peers. Adams County homes are less likely to have broadband internet access than those throughout the state or nation. Median household income in Adams County is the lowest among the 88 Ohio counties while the per capital income ranks 2nd lowest.

The Community Health Improvement Plan

Introduction

The Adams County Health Department is pleased to present the Adams County Community Health Improvement Plan for 2024-2026. This Community Health Improvement Plan, or CHIP, is an action-oriented strategic plan for improving the health and wellness of Adams County. It is a plan that relies upon many community partners—individuals, organizations, businesses, and governmental and non-governmental agencies—intentionally working together to improve the conditions in Adams County that impact the health and wellbeing of its residents.

The Adams County Community Health Assessment provided a comprehensive evaluation of the strengths and weaknesses of the health of the people of Adams County and the resources available to effect change. The CHIP is the next step in making Adams County a healthier and happier place to live and work, focusing on the health needs identified by the health assessment.

The Community Health Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plans are components of the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP), a community-driven strategic planning procedure for improving community health. Developed by the National Association of County and City Health Officials, this framework helps communities apply strategic thinking to prioritize public health issues and identify resources to address them.

The broad community representation of the Adams County Health and Wellness Coalition membership made it the ideal advisory body for both the Adams County Community Health Assessment and this Community Health Improvement Plan. While developed to respond to the specific needs of Adams County, this CHIP aligns with state priorities identified by the Ohio State Health Improvement Plan and national priorities outlined in Healthy People 2030.

Overview of Adams County

Demographics


Adams County is part of Ohio Appalachia, located along the Ohio River in southcentral Ohio. Encompassing 586 square miles, it is the 10th largest of Ohio's 88 counties. It is a rural county with a population density of 48.9 people per square mile, the 7th smallest in the state. It is also a poor county with a median household income of \$46,234 and a per capita income of \$25,428, ranking 88th and 87th respectively among Ohio counties. The U.S. Census Bureau reports 19.8% of people in Adams County live in poverty, the 5th highest in the State.

County Health Rankings

Adams County was ranked 88th of Ohio's 88 counties in Health Factors by the 2023 County Health Rankings & Roadmap project of the University of Wisconsin's Population Health Institute, and 81st in Health Outcomes. These are dubious distinctions for a county in a state ranked 40th among the nation in health behaviors by the United Health Foundation's 2023 America's Health Rankings Annual Report, and 43rd in health outcomes.

Mortality

The people of Adams County have the 6th lowest life expectancy among Ohio counties, which sadly is ranked the 42nd lowest state in the country. In 2020, Adams County's age-adjusted death rate was 24% higher than that observed in Ohio and the U.S.



Social Determinants of Health

The health of Adams County is significantly affected by many factors. Our county is a multigenerational area that holds tight to family tradition and support. Until recently, the majority of Adams County residents were born and raised in the county, only in the last 10 to 15 years have we seen an upswing of in-migration to the county from other areas and an out-migration of our local residents. The in-migration seems to be mostly retired families looking for a cheaper location to live and enjoy the natural beauty of our area as compared to the out-migration of our younger people looking for employment and higher income. The migration can be contributed to several factors, the largest impact is due to the lack of employment opportunities for good paying jobs that can support a family. Our county continuously ranks as one of the poorest if not the poorest in the State of Ohio annually for per capita income and median household income. Our county residents have relied on small family farms for generations to provide a secure income and support the family needs. This income was typically enough to cover the essentials to survive but not extra to thrive.

Adams County school aged children attend one of three school districts, the largest is Adams County/ Ohio Valley Local School, followed by Manchester Local Schools and lastly is the Adams County Christian School. The schools typically have one of lowest graduation rates in the state at 85% compared to the state at 91%. This lower graduation rate is apparent more in the older population as some only completed up to the eighth grade or dropped out prior to help out on the family farm if a family member became ill or passed away. As part of the Adams County/ Ohio Valley School District is the Ohio Valley Career and Technical School which provides career-based courses for high school students. These students are trained and ready to enter the workforce upon graduation. Adams County maintains the second largest Amish population in the State of Ohio. The Amish require their children to attend parochial schools with Amish

teachers. These schools, which there are five of in our county, only provide an eighth-grade education.

With Adams County being a rural farming community, the housing is mainly restricted to single family homes built in the early 1900's up to modern times. The majority of these homes, especially the older homes, are built on the family farm, it is not uncommon for the entire family to live on the farm or within a few miles of each other. There are a few multi-family apartment complexes in some of the villages throughout the county. The families of Adams County have always taken care of family, whether it be parents, grandparents, aunt and uncles living with their children, grandchildren, nieces or nephews; the family unit was always supported. This family support system limited the homelessness within the county. With the recent increase in drug addiction in our community we are now seeing more grandparents, aunt and Uncles raising grandkids, nieces and nephews due to parents being incarcerated, victims of overdose deaths or loosing custody due to the addiction. Within the last few years, with increase in drug use and Treatment Centers, the homelessness rate for our county has increased dramatically. We are seeing individuals from other areas move to our area for drug treatment then when they finish or drop out have nowhere to live and no one to rely on so they live wherever they can find for the night.

Collaborative Process

The steps to developing a plan to improve the health of the community began with the distribution of the Adams County Health Assessment to community leaders, stakeholders, collaborative partners, and community members. Input on health improvement priorities and strategies from groups representing vulnerable populations in Adams County was of particular interest to the advisory committee. Recommendations were sought from Manchester Local School District, Adams County Ohio Valley School District, Adams County Senior Citizens, Adams County Board of Commissioners, and community behavioral health providers. Significant congruity was noted between these recommendations and the consensus of focus groups and community meetings reported in the Community Health Assessment.

While the primary focus of this improvement plan is on the residents of Adams County, the advisory body recognizes that we are also part of larger state and national communities. A goal of the Adams County Health Improvement Plan is to align with health priorities and indicators recognized by Healthy People 2030 and the 2020-2023 State Health Improvement Plan, the most recent State Health Improvement Plan released in Ohio.

Many factors influence how well and how long individuals live, and by extension, the health and happiness of their communities. 

Adams County Health Priorities

Priority 1: Substance Abuse and Addiction

Since 2017 Adams County Community Health Assessments have identified substance abuse as the leading health problem in Adams County. While there are numerous indicators that reflect the impact of substance abuse on a community, deaths related to drug overdose dramatically illustrate the human toll of substance use disorders. As in 2017 and 2021, the death rate due to drug overdose in 2023 was significantly higher in Adams County than that recorded throughout Ohio and the U.S.



Why it's important in Adams County

- While the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports declining U.S. deaths due to overdose, the overdose death rate in Adams County has remained steady with a very slight decline in 2023 and 2024 based on preliminary data.
- 22.8% of Adams County 10th graders reported having had at least one drink of alcohol in the previous 30 days.
- 18.6% of Adams County 10th graders reported having used an electronic vaping device in the previous 30 days.
- 7.2 % of Adams County 10th graders reported having used heroin and 8.0% methamphetamine, greater than three times the rate reported by Ohio and U.S. peers.
- 18.6% of Adams County 10th graders reported having been offered, sold, or given an illegal drug on school property, greater than the rate reported nationally.

Priority 2: Mental Health

Mental health disorders have been identified as the second leading health problem in Adams County on every community health assessment since 2017. The Health Resource and Services Administration (HRSA) designates Adams County and Health Professional Shortage Area for Mental Health. Studies show that individuals with severe mental health disorders have a 10 to 25-years shorter life expectancy than those without, this due in large part to the presence of comorbid physical illnesses such as cardiovascular and respiratory disease.

Why it's important in Adams County

• Over one-third of adults in Adams County report having been diagnosed with a depressive disorder.


- Over 60% of Adams County adults reported their mental health not being good 1 or more days in the previous month, higher than rates reported in Ohio and the U.S.
- 38.1% of Adams County 7th graders and 35.8% of 10th graders reported feeling so sad or hopeless every day for 2 weeks or more that they stopped doing usual activities—symptoms of depression—in the previous year.
- 44.2% of Adams County 10th graders with symptoms of depression reported having seriously considered suicide in the previous year.


Priority 3: Chronic Disease

Chronic diseases are conditions that last 1 year or more and require ongoing medical attention or limit activities of daily living. They represent the leading cause of illness, disability, and death in the country. Most are caused by risk factors such as smoking, poor nutrition, physical inactivity, and excessive alcohol use.

Why it's important in Adams County

- Chronic disease represents 4 of the 5 most common causes of death in Adams County.
- Deaths rates for heart disease, cancer, chronic lung disease, cerebral vascular disease, Alzheimer's disease, and diabetes are all higher in Adams County than seen throughout Ohio and the nation.
- Almost 70% of Adams County adults reported being overweight or obese in 2023.
- 33.3% of Adams County adults reported current alcohol use in 2023
- 46.5% of Adams County 10th graders were either overweight or obese in 2023.
- Focus groups and community meetings cited a lack of recreational facilities for adults and youth as a health and wellness barrier in Adams County.
